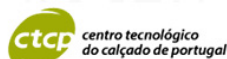

Shoes Made in EU—The European Shoemaker

Description

The project aims to strengthen Vocational Education and Training (VET) in the footwear sector through the development of a new curriculum for shoemakers, focusing on the engineering and manufacturing process, which takes into account new materials, processes and techniques. The curriculum will be based on the experience of Poland, Portugal, Italy, and Germany, which have a long tradition in the footwear sector, and will follow the EU Quality Framework and European Credit VET system (ECVET) for EU-wide recognition of the professional qualification. The course will also include the most innovative technological tools available in order to equip young people with the necessary skills and competences to increase their employability in the footwear sector. Furthermore, the project will promote specialised footwear education and training throughout Europe.

Objectives

- To improve and promote vocational and educational training in the footwear sector in Poland and other European countries
- To create an EU shoemaker training model and facilitate mobility in other European countries
- To match young shoemakers' skills with labour market needs

Expected Outcomes

- A transferrable, recognised and certified training course based on EQF and ECVET principles;
- Enhanced recognition of training in the footwear sector in countries where there is a lack of education opportunities, especially in Poland;
- An integrated training path which will include work-based learning;
- Enhanced skills and employability of young shoemakers
